

Providing support and advice for survivors of abuse

Staff receiving disclosures of historic abuse are urged to ensure that they respond promptly, professionally and sensitively to survivors. Each survivor will have different needs, and for many, being treated with a lack of compassion when disclosing historic abuse can be as damaging as the original abuse itself.
